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Drakeford Clocks and Watches made in Congleton, Cheshire - 1816 to 1865

Edward Drakeford (1779 - 1859) and his brother, John Drakeford (1784 - 1874) made clocks & watches in Congleton between 1816 and 1865.

This is a personal story by Jeremy Drakeford.

It was in 1971 that I stumbled upon my first Drakeford clock; my wife Sally had a car accident in thick fog near Chester and the garage owner who repaired the car, told me that he had an Edward Drakeford longcase clock in his porch at home. It stood in the porch of the bungalow because it was too tall to be inside!

To cut a long story short, 2 years later I was able to persuade this garage owner to exchange his clock for a much smaller new 'grandmother' clock costing me just £240.

So this clock(see photo right) took pride of place in our family home over the ensuing years during which time I established that Edward was clearly my great great grandfather who lived in Congleton, Cheshire and jointly made clocks & watches with his younger brother John.

I retired from my work in 1999 and we moved house to North Devon where it was in 2005 when I was contacted by my 5th cousin, David Drakeford from Dublin, who alerted me to an Internet enquiry by the owner of an Edward Drakeford longcase clock living on the West Coast of USA.

It was then I realised of the likelihood that the Drakeford brothers whose names as clock and watch makers were fully recorded in Brittens Book and also Loomes 'Watchmakers and Clockmakers of the World', that the Drakeford name is likely to appear on many other timepieces of their making between 1816 and 1865.

I then registered an earlier version of this website with search words linked to the name Drakeford and clocks and watches, and watches, and many owners throughout the world made contact with me or I was able to locate items for sale through my own searching.

So, through many intriguing experiences, I am now the owner of some 8 longcase clocks and have purchased others on behalf of other Drakefords including my cousin David who now lives in Co. Wicklow.

Early 19th century by Edward Drakeford



Of the 47 clocks/watches that I have so far recorded existing today, all where possible featured at the end of this paper, I can mention locations outside the UK as Washington State, USA; Brazil; Ohio, USA; Italy; Sweden; Berlin and Chicago, USA. The last one I airfreighted back from Chicago!

It can be noted that of the clocks/watches discovered to date, 32 are named to Edward, 10 to John and some 4 are just stated as 'Drakeford', possibly meaning that the family were working together at this particular time.

All these clocks were made in Congleton, Cheshire and I suppose in the early to mid 1800s, there was new wealth being created and a growing awareness for better timekeeping as the pace of life increased. There must have been a status symbol in bringing a grand clock into the family home without radio in those times, and sundials not precise instruments. Would the great Mills of the day have used sirens of some form to achieve worker punctuality and of course, with Churches mostly nearby, the clock chimes would be of help.

I display below a selection of clocks and a watch of significant interest for you to appreciate fully the variety of timepieces that were on offer from these two very skilled men.

One supposes that 'Messrs. Drakeford' would have had catalogues displaying the range of clocks and watches they were prepared to manufacture for potential customers. You will see the fantastic variation of dial design. Just compare the Roman and Arabic numerals and the subsidiary dials - moon dials, date dials and seconds dials, the curved date apertures, etc. Apart from my number one clock with a brass dial, all other clocks found have painted dials which fits well with the date period. And then there was the variation of dial paintings; who were the painters as they are not named, yet on the moon dials, without exception there is a building displayed shown opposite a ship? (The Drakefords were clearly involved in the Staffordshire pottery industry where artists were also working as painters of china).

The clockmaker, Drakeford in this case, is named on the face of the dials whereas the dialmaker's name if often on the reverse side of the dial and/or cast into the 'falseplate'.

The dialmakers (all from Birmingham) that I have come across with 'Drakeford clocks are:-

Walker & Hughes, Wright, Wilke & Son, & Finnamore.

So the Drakeford clockmakers would have obtained parts for the movements from a 'materials' supplier often in Birmingham, or made the parts themselves and then assembled the complete movement. The movements of all discovered Drakeford clocks appear similar. All the longcase clocks I have experienced have been 8 day mechanisms apart from some specialist time pieces upon which I elaborate separately. I have not come across a 30 hour clock.

The mahogany or oak cases, and their inlay and veneer work were probably made by specialist 'casemakers', local or otherwise, but built to the specifications of the clockmaker to satisfy customers' individual requirements.

There has to be a certain sadness that despite the clear evidence that the Drakeford brothers were registered in the Congleton Directories as having various premises over the years, there are no paper records remaining of day to day business activities.

A FULL LISTING OF DRAKEFORD CLOCKS DISCOVERED so far are featured where possible at the end of this paper but here are some examples with descriptions of specimen timepieces made between 1816 and 1865 by the Drakeford brothers:

Clock no. 1. Edward Drakeford - Congleton
The dial depicts the phases of the moon interspersed
with Astbury Church(the mother church of Congleton), the scene
believed to have been created by the painter, John Halifax.
This oak longcase clock circa 1800 is one of only two
known Drakeford clocks to have a brass dial of 18th century style.
One theory is that Edward Drakeford was requested to replace an
older movement with one of his making giving him the opportunity
to add his name plate to the brass dial on completion of the work.
The interior of the case appears to show a chalk writing 'Rode Hall',
which may mean it was originally at the Rode Hall, down the road
from Astbury, Congleton.



Clock No. 4. Edward Drakeford - Congleton A George III mahogany longcase clock, the eight day movement running on anchor escapement and having arched 14ins painted Roman dial decorated with flowers at the angles and pastoral vignette to the arch with subsidiary seconds dial and crescent date aperture: the case having caved 'Chinese' cushion pediment above parcel gilded swan neck moulding and flanking reeded columns, the crossbanded shape flame veneered door flanked by quartered reeded columns, the panelled base raised on ogee feet, 8ft 3ins.



Watch No. 8. John Drakeford – Congleton A silver cased pocket watch with white enamelled dial & signed fusee lever movement 'John Drakeford - Congleton, No. 9413. Case dated 1819 with Anchor for Birmingham. In the back of the case are three watch tickets: One stating John Drakeford, Clock & Watchmaker, Congleton. There is a picture assumed to be old father time with a sickle. On the perimeter of the ticket it states, 'Fishing Tackle of all descriptions' and 'Wedding Rings' - Plate &c. The second ticket states 'Adams Clock & Watch Maker, Middlewich - Buys Old Gold, Silver, Brafs, Pewter or Lead. Sells Gold Rings &c. The third ticket has written on it in ink 'Cleaned April 1845' and then 'Cleaned Jan 1847'.



Clock No. 17. Edward Drakeford – Congleton A delightful wall clock, the only one of its type that has been discovered for this maker. This is today owned by a distant relative with the expectation that it has continued in family ownership since its making.



Clock No. 21. Drakeford - Congleton Victorian 8 day oak longcase clock with painted dial. This is unusually without the Christian name attached the the maker: 'Drakeford'. Edward had a son, William (1819 - 1849) who was recorded as a Clockmaker, probably working with his father. Could this clock be of his making?



Clock No. 29. Drakeford - Congleton
This clock was in Italy in the Turin/Milan area with a dealer having
bought it from a distinguished Italian family. This clock has perhaps
the best case I have ever seen with beautiful veneer worn on
mahogany. A very high price indicated for sale after restoration.
Fascinating - another Drakeford clock without Christian name.



Clock No. 33. Edward Drakeford - Congleton Early 19th Century 8 day unusual pine clock. This came up for auction in Berlin, so a ferry crossing and autobahn travel was required to bring this clock back home to England.



Clock No. 37. John Drakeford - Congleton An 'Apprentice piece' made by John Drakeford circa 1816. Very much a special one-off one would suspect. This is an 8 day miniature grandfather clock, under 6ft in height with an alarm and a single winding hole. The dial (East or West Coast style) is unusual for this period, but all features emphasise the 'apprentice' really wanting to make his mark!



Clock No. 40. Edward Drakeford - Congleton
An unusual charming mahogany cased alarum clock with
an arabic numbered painted dial being 8½ inches into an arch. 3
western dressed ladies watch Moses in a basket on The Nile.
Pyramids are in the background. Both the arched hood and the dial
door have box wood inlay.
The bood also has long side windows. The key wound movement

The hood also has long side windows. The key wound movement runs for about 48 hours and the alarm is wound by pulling the weighted rope down by hand. The clock is certainly rare and attractive that may well have been Edward's Apprentice piece(see 37 above). Circa early 19th Century.



Clock No. 43. Edward Drakeford - Congleton

An illustration in the authoritative book 'The Georgian Bracket Clock - 1714 to 1830 by Richard C. R. Barder'. The owner of this clock is not known, but through the purchase of the above Clock No. 40, a strong likeness can be recognised and it is exciting to see such an eminent book choosing to illustrate Edward Drakeford's work. Page 196, shows Illustration Plate VI/28 Title: E. Drakeford, Congleton, Cheshire. Unusual mahogany provincial clock. Normally provincial bracket clocks follow London styles. This is an exception. Circa 1815. This clock is also referred to on Page 193 of this book.


